Rector's Message

Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then is there no healing for the wound of my people? Jeremiah 8:22

Jeremiah 8:22 is pretty well known and is typically thought to be a note of frustration for the people of the exile. Gilead was a place in scripture northeast of the Jordan River. The balm referred to in Jeremiah 8 is a resin or ointment from the storax tree which possessed healing properties. So. Jeremiah seems to lament that there is healing to be found in Gilead but not in the place Israel was. Israel and, in the moment, Jeremiah, feels cut off from the healing power of God. When I hear this passage I always think of our profound need for healing, the kind that cannot be found in a medication or resin but one that comes from God and involves the spirit. There is so much brokenness and deadness of spirit in the world. We live in a world and time where healing is so intensely needed but rarely sought or spoken of.

Luke 8 deals with (for me, at least) the profoundly touching tale of Jesus healing a man possessed by a demon. The demon calls itself "Legion" because there are so many of them. We have all felt a bit possessed by this or that, hung up by a sorrow, an anger or hurt, deadened by loneliness or loss. Jesus' answer, always, to our need for healing, is to say "yes." There are times when that healing feels slow in coming and we are always called to really lean into this question: what do we really need and what is God's real role in my situation. Healing is mysterious and complex and God does not answer to our beck and call but does breathe life into us in unexpected and powerful ways; but not always healing us in the way we had thought He would; or hoped He would.

The great Afro-Spiritual There is a Balm in Gilead sings in its first verse: "Sometimes I feel discouraged, and think my work's in vain, but then the Holy Spirit revives my soul again ... There is a balm in Gilead, to make the wounded whole ..." Enslaved black populations in this country sang Balm in Gilead, not because they were sick, not because they were old, but because they were oppressed, beaten, and their freedom had been stolen. They believed in a very powerful way that the healing of God means freedom, if only in their hearts, but hopefully, one day, physical freedom, too.

Healing takes many forms, intensities, and realties. In our 2019-2020 program year, we are going to explore Who is Jesus to me, really? by focusing on healing. We will look at Jesus, the healer, and at what healing means, which traditions believe in the possibility of healing, what does medicinal healing have to say about spiritual healing, and so much more. A starting point is an acceptance that we are all in need of healing and the hope, love, and resurrected power of Christ is a good place for us to begin to look. To our search for healing Jesus says, remember this always, "I am willing." And He touches us.

Welcome Back Sunday, September 8th!

We hope that this summer has been a grand one for all of our St. James community; time for rest, relaxation, family and fun. If you've been away over the summer, welcome back! If you've been at summer worship, welcome back to our regular worship schedule of 2 services. We begin our 2019–2020 program year on **Sunday, September 8**th, with the return to our two Sunday Eucharistic services: our 8 a.m. Rite I (spoken) service of Holy Eucharist and our second service at 10:15 a.m. (Rite II with hymns and choir). Church school will begin, also returning on the 8th, at 10 a.m.



There will be no picnic following the 10:15 service this year as we are gearing up to celebrate Fr George's return with a Living History Tour and festive dinner on Saturday, September 28th (see that news later in this *Epistle*). We hope you will plan to join us, invite your neighbors, and celebrate the beginning of another program year. Let us praise God for all of His goodness and mercies, for the great privilege or being together in community, in His name.

- Noah Wallace School site of first meeting place for St. James Mission
- The Chapel of the Mission current site of Village Store on Mill Lane
- The Unionville Museum (tentative) short history presentation on relationship between Christ Church, Unionville and St. James Mission
- Christ Church, Avon (tentative) former church from which many current St. James parishioners originated.

Storytelling workshops with The Rev. Cindy Maybeck

Oh, how I love to tell the story! Storytelling offers a vehicle for engaging with scripture as a way to ground its spiritual relevance to our lives. Biblical storytelling nurtures our spiritual growth as Christians. When we tell and hear biblical stories, we naturally connect them to the stories of our own lives. Our faith becomes enriched and our fellowship with one another deepens and blossoms.

As a biblical storyteller, I bring gifts of spiritual vitality and renewed energy into many a church. I am delighted to offer my gifts of storytelling ministry to St. James Episcopal Church in September during Fr. Roberts' sabbatical. It has been a joy to provide leadership at two Vestry retreats and to preach in worship on a Sunday in Advent a couple of years ago. Your dear church is familiar to me.

I will begin and end my work with you in Sunday morning worship on Sundays, September 8th and September 29th, as I tell the Gospel by heart and offer storytelling-styled homilies. In between these two Sundays, I will lead five workshops to explore storytelling with you, using a variety of themes. You may come to one, two, or even to all five; each workshop will explore different biblical stories with different stories about church life. One workshop will be a family event, specifically focused to welcome families including children, youth and adults. Here is your menu of biblical storytelling workshops.

- Finding Your Story of Faith

 Sharing stories about God calling us to use our gifts
- Telling Our Family Story of Faith
 Saturday, September 21st, 10:00 am

 An intergenerational workshop for children, youth and adults.
 Sharing family stories about church life
- There is a Balm in Gilead: Your Faith Has Made You Well Thursday, September 26th, 7:00 pm
 Sharing stories about healing in body, soul and society



Each workshop will be 90 minutes long. We have scheduled them on different weekdays and Saturdays so that everyone may be able to attend one or more. Please mark your calendar now so that you will save these special times in September. I will hold your parish in prayer during this sabbatical season and look forward to seeing you soon.

Who is Jesus to me, really? meets What is healing?

Last year we launched a two-year program of asking ourselves the question: Who is Jesus to me, really? One of the ways that we explored this question was through Bible Study. Last year we moved through Matthew's Gospel and are currently nearing the end of our exploration of Luke. What we've discovered so far is the complexity of the Gospel witness, how different they sometimes are (one from the other), and what a gracious and loving God we have in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Beginning in late October, we will launch our study of Mark's Gospel, using NT Wright again (For Everyone–Mark), to help guide us. For September and most of October we'll complete our deep dive into Luke's Gospel. Please join us in this encounter with God's story of Christ through Luke, meeting between the Sunday services.

Another strand of our exploration of *Who is Jesus to me, really?* will help us confront and discuss the area of healing. Healing is something we normally consider mystical and in the realm of evangelicals. But remember, healing takes many forms. We are going to have a number of speakers, beginning



with The Reverend Tom Furrer, Priest in Charge at Trinity, Wethersfield, who will talk to us about healing ministry, his work at the Kateri Clinic in Nigeria, and how mission and healing intersect. We will later welcome a physician among us to discuss his experiences of healing and how both his vocation as a doctor and faith as a Christian intersect. More to come ...

Finally, we will be launching, on the second Monday of every month, a new opportunity to engage in dialogue that we are calling *Faith and Fries: Exploring Questions and Mysteries*. The name may change, but the idea is moving forward. During our *RenewalWorks* explorations in 2018, one suggestion for community connection, being more engaged Christians in our own town, was to begin a faith-based conversation somewhere in the community. **Beginning on Monday, November 11th at 7 pm at the Wood 'n Tap in Farmington**, and the second Monday of each month thereafter, we will hold a casual, open, anyone-is-invited conversation on the mysteries and questions of faith. The format will be a question or subject area (let's say, what do we think healing means to us as 21st



century humans?) and folks will be encouraged to share, ask questions, voice concerns, etc. The Fries, in the *Faith and Fries*, means folks are welcome to have a drink, get something to eat, relax, and engage in meaningful dialogue. We hope that folks in the parish will not only come and take advantage of this, but will also invite neighbors, friends, people who maybe are "spiritual but not religious," and whomsoever you choose. Sound like fun?

The Rev. Susan Gibson, pastor of First Church of Christ, Congregational in Farmington and Fr. George are in conversation about furthering our dialogue on faith and race, possibly in the context of healing, during Lent 2020. Stay tuned for more information!

Formation, in the Christian context, says that we are constantly trying to be formed into whoever it is God is calling us to be. Study and experience - in community - are truly indispensable ways of coming to know God in Christ more fully and deeply. We strongly encourage you to get involved in some way in adult formation this year. If you have ideas about a program that might bring us into contact with God, please let Fr. George know.

THE REV. CINDY MAYBECK

- Cindy will preach on Sept. 8, lead five biblical storytelling workshops in September, and preach on Sept. 29. According to Cindy: "The point is to hear stories from Scripture and hear and tell stories from our own lives, which helps to build community."
- Each Vestry member will sign up to "run" one of the workshops, in a pair. That person will write a 2-3 bullet summary afterwards and get it to Sue, set up ahead of time with whatever supplies Cindy needs, provide light snacks, and tell Cindy how many people have signed up.

FINANCE/TREASURER'S REPORT

 Our income for the month is \$10K under budget, but we had a big month budgeted. June's budget was more conservative. On expense side nothing has really changed from prior report.

MOTION (Mimi) to approve the report, Cathie seconded, the motion carried unanimously. Discussion: The choir collars are in need of dry cleaning. Julia will talk to her dry cleaner who might give a discount and will follow up with Rebecca. All are in agreement.

MINUTES FROM MAY

MOTION (Dona) to approve the minutes, Cathie seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

STEWARDSHIP

 Campaign planning is off to a good start. There is a committee of 8 chaired by Michael Slusarz and Linda Larkin. People have volunteered to give testimonials starting 10/20 for 4 weeks. Dona Waugh is chairing Thanksgiving and In-gathering Dinner. Vestry agrees to embrace the campaign.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- We have a goal of engaging the wider community and having a planned fellowship initiative, perhaps in partnership with FCC in Farmington and UCC in Unionville to welcome those who may have interest in a talk about current events that is faith-driven, maybe once a month, with fellowship. We intend to reach community members who might not go to church but are driven by faith and could be looking for fellowship, and such an event may also appeal to a broader demographic. This is a way to follow through on community outreach ideas that came out of RenewalWorks.
- There has been a recommendation to hold such an event at an outside venue like Wood N Tap, Taprock, or the library.
- FCC is very interested in working on this with us. They have a full-time family minister who would like to help get this started. Fr. George will do some advertising when he returns, in places like Farmington Patch, Valley Press, etc.

OLIVIA ROBERTS GOLD PROJECT

Olivia is working towards Girl Scouting's highest award. Her project is creating a music program to allow kids with special needs to make music on a Sunday afternoon. She is asking for use of the Parish Hall and has written a formal letter to the Vestry. It would be like anyone else who rents our space, she is just asking for our tables and chairs and the space. MOTION (EJ) to allow this use of the space, Rebecca seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

- Review report of June 4 meeting with Jim Tuttle about a vision for creating a feasibility study for some modifications to the church. All should read this and reflect on it. Come back with questions and comments.
- This would be the beginning of a phased project to raise capital to modify the church to become ADA accessible while addressing some other structural issues for the church property. Phase 1 would be a feasibility study; Phase 2 would be a capital campaign; Phase 3 would be the building project.
- The current proposal is for Jim to scope out the options: what is needed, what is wanted, what
 are the costs, etc. In a future meeting the committee will come up with a cost to put before
 Vestry. Read carefully and come back with questions and comments. Current expense would
 be \$1,000 to conduct the study and that is already budgeted for. Any further expense will
 have to be budgeted for next year or spread across multiple years.

MUSIC SERIES

 Rebecca will look into organizing a music series with a mix of classical and contemporary music. Could be a way to bring new people into our space. Cathie and Todd to look into whether a non-profit can charge for tickets to an event.

MOTION (Rebecca) to adjourn, Mimi seconded, the motion carried unanimously. We closed in prayer and adjourned at 9:24 pm.


