Rector's Message

Thanks be to thee, O Lord Jesus Christ, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne for me; for all the many blessings thou hast won for me. Most holy Jesus, most merciful redeemer, friend, and brother: may I see thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day.

--- Attributed to Richard of Chichester

I have, very recently, rediscovered the above prayer that has a couple of places of resonance. I did not know, until I became an Episcopalian, that the song from Godspell that I loved, Day by Day, was actually a revised setting, as it were, of a song from our Hymnal 1982 (as are quite a few pieces from that same musical, not so coincidentally). But a kind parishioner recently gifted me with a new copy of the St. Augustine Prayer Book which has been around since 1947 (originally from the Order of the Holy Fathers, now distributed and edited by Forward Movement). I love this particular Prayer Book which is full of wonderful "set" prayers, many of them from the Catholic tradition. One of the prayers that I don't remember from earlier editions is the one above, attributed to Richard of Chichester, an English bishop of the middle ages. I have been meditating on this prayer a good bit of late, so much so that I have now set it to memory. For me the prayer says nearly everything we might want and/or need to say to God, in microcosm, through Christ. The prayer is full of thanksgivings to Jesus "for all the pains and insults" Christ has endured for my salvation, all the blessings Christ has given me, and acknowledging our Lord as the One who is "merciful redeemer, friend, and brother." We often, in these times filled with worry, uncertainty, fear, pain and, for some, even death, forget gratitude for all God is, has been, will be and could be in our lives.

But the last part of the Richard of Chichester's beautiful prayer asks for the wisdom, the strength, and the courage to see God in Christ more clearly, the strength to love Him more and more, and to follow Him in the path that He would have us go, more nearly, day, by day, by day. You see we continue to struggle, even as states like our own "reopen" and try to get back to something like "normalcy," with the fear of the contagion that has plagued the world since, really, December of last year and, in the U.S., since February. We so much want things to go back to the way they were and for work, relationships, and church to be the things to us that they were before COVID-19 upended everything. What we might be asking ourselves, in addition to honoring the anxiety and fear we may be experiencing, is how might I live more fully into the blessings that I do have? How might I pray for gratitude to God for all that God has made me; done for me? How could my journey with God be seen as something I am doing with God, rather than against God or without God entirely?

God is ever-present, ever-loving, and always merciful. Perhaps we have to learn to pray again, in this strange season of upended or delayed dreams. I know that our seniors have missed out on much of the rites of passage that accompany finishing high school or college. I realize that nurses and doctors,

custodians and respiratory therapists have been pushed to the breaking point and I cannot imagine the anxiety of health care workers in places like New York City, Rome, or Wuhan. We have lost a lot in the



last few months besides the freedom to move around, yes? But we have not lost God's goodness nor our ability to pray for God's guidance and to be thankful for all of God's blessings. Life often changes for, the better, in direct proportion to how we see God's goodness at work, even in bad times, times of uneasy change or anxiety. Life is, still, a gift and God's mercy, in the person of Jesus Christ, is the ultimate gift of new life. Here we are, still, in spite of it all. And thanks be to God for His mercy and redeeming love.

The last time I wrote for the *Epistle* in March, the world was just beginning to close down. It's hard to believe that it has been two months that we have been "staying safe at home" in Connecticut. It is also important to remember that there are so many people that are unable to stay at home – our healthcare workers and all essential workers. My family has placed a wooden heart "thank you" sign in our yard to show that we are thinking of all who are working to keep us safe, but that is only a symbolic gesture and our gratitude for all the essential workers cannot be put into words. We continue to pray for those who have become ill with COVID-19 and those whose lives have been lost due to this terrible disease.

This is also really hard for those who are staying at home, although the journey for us is very different. Families are now spending all their time together, children are learning remotely and missing their schools and friends, and grandparents can no longer hug their grandchildren. We worry about where to get toilet paper, we can't leave the house without a face mask, and Facebook is now filled with postings that someone has found flour or hand sanitizer at a local store. For all of us, our lives have become much smaller and so different. Regardless of your situation, St. James is here for

you. Father George is working hard to bring us our weekly Sunday service via Facebook Live, and he has been reaching out to as many parishioners as he can to check in. As we no longer see each other each week, it can be harder for us to know if someone needs extra prayers or some extra help. Please do not hesitate to reach out.

We do not know when we will all be able to be together once again in our physical church, but our church family remains strong. Whether it is the Vestry working hard (via Zoom) to ensure that we maintain our fiscal health during these trying times or the community gathering together for a joyous birthday parade for Chloe, the

church is still a central focus for many of us. I can't wait to see everyone in person again but, until it is safe to do so, I will be staying safe at home and praying for all of you. Stay safe and healthy!

Stepping forward toward a re-opening

On June 21st, we plan to begin holding public, in-person worship at St. James Parish for the first time since March 15th. Houses of worship were not in the Governor's first phase of a four-phase plan to re-open Connecticut. Our Bishops and the Episcopal Church in CT (ECCT) have given us a good set of protocols and directions to follow, but also some latitude for us to do much of our own planning and strategizing about how we will reimagine public worship and what specific measures we will take to keep folks safe. I have discussed initial possibilities with the Vestry and am going through the process of detailed planning with assistance from the staff, some of our ministry heads, and other dedicated folk. Worship will feel and seem, for a long while most likely, very different than it has in the past. Social distancing (no touching at the Peace, etc.), the wearing of masks during worship, no congregational singing (at least in the beginning), and other sacrifices must be made in order for us to be safe and healthy together. We will share with you more specific ways and means of staying safe and healthy as we plan our return to public worship, as plans develop.

We also understand that for many it will be a while before you (and possibly your family) are comfortable coming to public worship. We completely understand!! Anyone in a higher risk category (folks over 65, people









with underlying conditions that might make them more vulnerable to illness) should prayerfully consider whether you should attend worship at all for the time being. We will not, however (and of course), not prevent anyone from coming that wishes to, as long as you are not currently sick or know that you are infected with COVID-19. It should go without saying that if you are feeling unwell on the day of worship or for several days leading up to worship, you should stay at home and attend to your needs. Some of you, regardless of your current health status, may choose to stay at home, too, which we also understand.

Everyone should decide for themselves, in terms of coming to public worship, what your present level of comfort is. We will do our best to reassure you with our preparation and plans, but want everyone to make decisions that feel right to them. We will continue to livestream worship on Facebook Live for the foreseeable future, long after we have begun public worship. We have a month to plan and prepare for us being together and we are delighted to hear from you with questions and thoughts. We are going to figure this out together and it will be a blessing just to have the possibility of being together again! Much more information will be forthcoming in the weeks ahead!!!!

Beginning Sunday, June 21st and continuing through Labor Day weekend, we will continue with single Sunday worship service (Rite II). The time of the service is TBD, based on the results of the online survey emailed to our parish households on May 27th. NO nursery or childcare will be available during the summer. Wednesday at 5:30 p.m., and Compline on Friday at 7:30 p.m.


