Rector's Message

Here we are, you and I, on the precipice of a time of sabbatical. On June 23rd, following worship, I will depart for a three month long period away from St. James Parish, a stepping away for a short season as your rector. We have been talking about this, really, for nearly three years, as we began to work on the Lilly Grant that will fund my time away since December of 2016! You are probably not surprised to know that the word sabbatical comes from Sabbath, meaning "to rest," which in the Jewish tradition is Friday into Saturday. For us, in the Christian tradition, our day of sabbath is on Sunday, the day we hold that Jesus Christ rose from the dead. Sabbaticals are common in the world of college/university academic life but not as much in ministry. But there is much wisdom in taking some time away to refresh, reenergize, renew, and find a new creative spirit. I am so very grateful that St. James is giving me this wonderful time away.

A short reminder of where I will be going and what I will be doing. Tracey and I are going to go to England together in July. A big part of our time together will be walking about 95 miles of the old Canterbury Way, an ancient pilgrimage that was once undertaken by pilgrims to visit the shrine of Thomas à Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, who was martyred in 1170. We will walk toward Canterbury from Guilford through glens and vales of the North Downs area of southeastern England. Our girls will come over and join us later in the month and we will travel to London, Bath, Wales, and other places. Then I will pilgrimage alone to some of the great cathedral cities of England: Lincoln, York, Durham, and ending at Lindisfarne (Holy Island), from which northeastern England was evangelized with the good news of Jesus Christ in the 7th century. After I return to Connecticut, I will spend many weeks hiking, journaling, praying, meeting with my spiritual director, etc. My time away has been carefully constructed to allow as much time for fun, prayer, and renewal as possible, with the wonderful assistance of the resources from Lilly.

A major part of the sabbatical process was inspired by Luke 19:1-10, the story of Zacchaeus, the tax collector. Remember that in the story, Zacchaeus climbs the sycamore-fig tree to get a better look at Jesus, as the Lord passes through the town of Jericho. Zacchaeus changed his vantage point so that he could get a closer, unobstructed view of Jesus. Pilgrimage, as we have said, is really changing location and we need not travel to England to do it. My hope for me is that my time away will allow me to change the location of my life, reprioritize what is most important in my role as your pastor and rector. I am hopeful, as well, that St. James' people will take the opportunity to change your location a bit, by thinking about your role and life at St. James. Where is God calling you into the future life of our community? Most importantly, where is God trying to strengthen and renew you? Remember that in September (more to come on this) there will be five workshops on storytelling, specifically designed for our parish. How we hear and tell stories in the context of our life with God can really send us into a deeper search of God's call on our lives.

Finally, please remember that I am only taking time away; I am not leaving St. James, just taking some time away. My commitment to and love for St. James remains undiminished and my hope is that some refueling and reimagining will make me a more effective pastor, rector, and spiritual leader in this community. That said, I wish to remind everyone that this is your community, no matter who is celebrating Holy Eucharist, delivering the sermon, or making pastoral visits. The future life and strength of this parish is in the hands of you, its beloved community. Please don't be a stranger to the parish this summer. Our friend Bob Stocksdale will be capably leading worship and visiting while I am away. My sabbatical does not begin until June 23rd, so feel free to call me, come by for a visit, ask me about my time away, etc.

Celebration of Ministry and Renewal: a brief farewell

As you have heard, we will be celebrating the beginning of Fr. George's sabbatical in an exciting and, we hope, meaningful way. On Sunday, June 23rd, at 9 am, you are cordially invited to a special breakfast in the parish hall. We will already be engaged in our summer service schedule, so please note the change in time. We will have a festive breakfast together before gathering outside to plant a



new tree, a sycamore that you can read more about on the next page.

At 10 a.m., following the planting of the tree, we will enter the sanctuary for our usual service of music and Holy Communion with a special leave–taking liturgy. Fr. Robert

Stocksdale, the priest who will celebrate worship and care for us while Fr. George is away, will be present to assist and say farewell to Fr. George and his family for a season.

On Saturday, September 28th, at 2:30 p.m., with Fr. George and his family participating, we will gather at the church. Shortly thereafter, we will depart from St. James and go to three sites via shuttle that are vital in the life of St. James: to the Old Deming store (now on Mill Lane), Unionville (site of the original Christ Church), to the site of (former) Christ Church, Avon, and finally, back to St. James. Along the way, and at the sites, we will hear the story of St. James, Farmington, how she began as a mission church of Christ Church, Unionville, became her own parish, and continues to serve the Farmington Valley.

We will return around 4:30 pm to St. James and prepare for a celebratory Italian dinner in the parish hall, catered from Naples (pizza, not the city in Italy). All are invited to join us on the tour and dinner, or just come to dinner!! Fr. George will return to his role as pastor and rector on Sunday, September 29th, with The Rev. Cindy Maybeck, who will lead our workshops (see the article about those in this *Epistle* for more information), preaching and telling the Gospel story by heart. The Rev. Robert Stocksdale will preside over his final services with us as supply priest.

Summer Worship Schedule

Beginning Sunday, June 16th and continuing through Labor Day weekend, we will have a single Sunday worship service (Rite II) at 9 a.m. The exception is Sunday, June 23rd when we'll gather at 9 am for a farewell breakfast followed by worship, as we send Fr. George off on sabbatical with all our best wishes. Nursery and childcare will be available. Wednesday Prayer & Eucharist services at noon are discontinued throughout the summer as Fr. George is on sabbatical.

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Our own sycamore tree!

The sycamore tree has existed on earth for more than 100 million years. It is a strong tree, not easily felled, with an excellent root system. Its timber is tough and hard to split. It has patches of creamy white and reddish-brown color all over its surface. The dark-colored bark is the part of the old tree and the light color is the fresh bark. This multi-colored, multi-layered bark protects the tree from temperature extremes, storms and attacks by enemies. The sycamore tree is broad, reaching far out, extending protection and shade to all. It symbolizes strength, eternity and divinity.

It is this tree that Zacchaeus climbed to get a better view of Jesus. It also an appropriate symbol of our St. James faith community ... strong, with excellent roots, an outer protection of older and newer bark, tough and hard to split, reaching out to others with comfort and shelter.



On Sunday, June 23rd, we will plant a sycamore tree on the church grounds. Father George begins his sabbatical and this planting is to be the symbolic springboard of our own church journey to renew, reunite and rekindle ourselves. Early in June you may pick up a small, biodegradable container. These are to be filled with soil from our own yards, from cemetery plots where former church members are interred, and from the grounds of various church ministries. We will add these soil containers to the tree on planting day, thus proclaiming that the past and the present will provide nourishment for our future life in Christ.

Farmington Food Pantry June Collection

Every year the St. James family has committed to providing non-perishable food items, household items and cash to the Farmington Food Pantry for the months of January and June. The Farmington Food Pantry and the 200 local families that it currently serves depend greatly on these donations. Each month the pantry provides deserving families with 7,000+ pounds of non-perishable items.

Specific items of need are tuna fish and other canned meat products, cereal, and personal care items. Throughout the month of June, please place your donations in the grey bin marked *Farmington Food Pantry* located in the narthex.

The donated items are delivered to The First Church of Christ, Farmington where the Food Pantry is housed. The Farmington Food Pantry is affiliated with Foodshare which allows the Food Pantry to use any monetary donations to purchase supplemental food at a significantly reduced price.

All clients are pre-qualified through Farmington Social Services (FSS). Clients may shop at the Food Pantry twice a month, making an appointment through FSS. The St. James Outreach Ministry thanks you for your generous and continued support of the Farmington Food Pantry.

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Summary of Vestry Minutes - April 16, 2019

MINUTES FOR MARCH

MOTION (Todd) to approve the March minutes, Michael seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

MINISTRY REPORTS

Finance/Treasurer's report - March, 2019 - EJ Ososki

- On the income side we are about \$7,000 behind, the same as last month. Pledging is down by \$2,000, but last month was down by \$5,000. Two mutual funds paid in April and another will pay later this month. We're closing the gap.
- On the expense side, the heating oil bill seems off, but Wendy will work with Quinoco to determine if there has been a mistake.
- We received a beguest of \$5,000.

MOTION (Todd) to approve the Treasurer's report with the request to have the Anne P. Root fund balance clarified next month, Robyn seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

Adult Formation - report on Becoming Blessed Community: Sacred Conversations - Fr. George

- We were encouraged with participation in this series, which was 20-35 people weekly with even representation from both St. James and First Church Congregational.
- There will be a report in the May *Epistle* with talking points.
- There was no intention to have action, we were just "turning the soil."
- There is openness about further conversation, having guest speakers, etc. Some wanted to go deeper, but that was never the intent. Table and partner conversations were lively. There is openness around partnering with FCC again in the future.

New Business

Capital Projects

- We should create a three-year plan for what we want to accomplish to make this building more accessible. Then make a plan for financing the projects: capital fundraising, looking for grants, taking money from the reserve fund? Kim can help with fundraising and grants.
- First step is that Fr. George will talk with Nathan Tuttle about next steps, what projects we
 want to tackle. Then authorize a budget for a planning, design, and feasibility study that will
 be used to guide other decision making. In order to ask a firm for a feasibility study we need
 to develop a one-page summary of the problems, goals, and constraints. Goal: To make us
 more handicapped accessible.
- Potential projects: interior/exterior lift (cost is \$40-85,000), ramp to the door by the mailbox or regrading the path, parking or roundabout in the front yard to make a drop-off space, mechanized door to replace door by the mailbox, rekeying all exterior doors. We will also have to determine whether we weave a new roof into this same planning cycle.

OLD BUSINESS

Sabbatical

- Tree project Joyce Bettencourt has ordered dirt containers, everything is set to go. This will happen Sunday, June 23rd. Breakfast, tree, service.
- **Budget** \$4,800 for the breakfast, the dinner, and the tour.

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- Breakfast, June 23rd Cathie has catering plan finalized, will ask people to help out in making a few other things. Cathie will be doing a formal invitation. Cost is \$500.
- Dinner, Saturday, September 28th Dona has spoken to Naples, they need only a week's notice. Possible "dessert on the patio" after dinner, with music and decorations. Cost is \$1,200. Rebecca will inquire about a lead on music for the evening. We should consider childcare for the dinner.
- Living History tour Bill Church is the lead. The tour was conceived when we wrote the Lilly grant. Some people feel like there are 3 congregations: those who have been here a short time, those who have been here a long time, and those who came to us from Christ Church Avon. We want a chance for everyone to hear the history of St. James in the places that this happened, and new and older parishioners would have the chance to prepare to tell the stories. We will travel in sequence to different places in the life of the parish: Deming Store on Mill Lane, then original site of Christ Church Unionville which we were an outgrowth of, and then site of Christ Church Avon talking about how it was built and grew, the deconsecration of the church, and how those folks joined us. We would end back at St. James and then have the dinner on September 28th. Cost of the buses is \$1,300.
- Workshops with Cindy Maybeck September 10th, 18th, and 26th from 6:30–8 pm and Saturdays September 14th & 21st, beginning at 10 am. Put these in your calendars. Both signups and walk-ins are welcome. Vestry members to be in charge of being there to set anything up, get things going, sign-up sheet amongst us for that. For the evenings we feel we should have a little soup and salad and dessert the way we did at the Sacred Conversations events. Wardens (and any else interested) to meet with The Rev. Cindy Maybeck at summer's end to discuss the workshop for children and families, which we committed to holding on September 21st. Todd and Cathie will get a late August date on the calendar with Cindy. We all have Cindy's email so that we can be in touch with her when it is our turn to host.

Stewardship

- Meeting Thursday, May 2nd at 7 pm at Wood N Tap to break out roles; Michael has agreed to co-chair and Fr. George is going to ask a second person
- Discussion by Vestry of when to start and end the Stewardship season this year. After much discussion of dates and other events, we agreed to end on November 17th and track backward four weeks to begin on 10/20.

RECTOR'S THOUGHTS

- Ascension Evensong, Thursday, May 30th, at 7 pm with reception to follow. Beautiful Anglican tradition that many folks haven't actually experienced. Noonday Prayers in the Chapel every day from then until Pentecost.
- Youth Confirmation at St. Luke's, Darien, Saturday, June 1st, at 10 am. May 19th confirmands will have a special part in the service. May 5th is Youth Sunday so youth will lead the service.
- Pentecost, Sunday, June 9th
- Next Vestry meeting is Thursday, May 16th

MOTION (Todd) to adjourn the meeting, Kim seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

We closed in prayer and adjourned at 8:48 pm.

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
