Rector's Message

You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. Matthew 5: 14-16

One of my favorite pictures (and moments) of my recent sabbatical is one that I took of a sunset on Holy Island, Lindisfarne, in Northumberland (northeast England). The photograph shows the sun setting over the ruins of the old priory (monastery), near the site where Aidan established the first religious community on the island in the 7th century. Aidan was a great proclaimer of the Good News of Jesus Christ, evangelizing the people of northeast England; Aidan did not speak their language



and always needed an interpreter. But Aidan was called to share the love and hope of Christ in a world that did not know Him and spent his entire adult life engaged in that work, that love, that hope.

The image of the sun setting may seem to be a message of waning, a decrease in power and intensity. But I believe that the combination of a brilliant, setting sun (the light of Christ that never truly fades) and the Priory (a place focused on growing the faith and knowledge of Christ) create a

wonderful connection to Matthew's Gospel. We are the lights of the world and are exhorted by the Crucified and Risen Christ to shine that light to all the world. During this stewardship season we will talk a lot about how our gifts and giving help our parish community to shine the light of Christ out onto the world. Shining the light of Christ also means becoming more comfortable in our journey with God in Jesus, tapping into and fostering our own inner light that is God's presence. Monks spend a lifetime learning how to pray and offering praise to God. We are not monks but our lights can shine as bright as any, if our hearts have the courage to seek, take chances, and grow in faith, love, and hope. Connecting with the created world can help us go deeper into Christ' light, as can community worship and praying together. Service and mission are an expression of our understanding that we have been given a light that needs to be shared.

I look forward to sharing the many twists and turns of my sabbatical as we move forward together. I am so overjoyed to be back among you. The light of Christ burns brightly in this place called St. James. We are a "city on a hill" in the darkness of a world that struggles with many, many things. We must not, however, keep the light inside our church or our hearts. We must shine our light before all and that takes time, learning, and a willingness to grow. Shall we go together on this journey?

Grace and peace to you. I am reminded that "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven." Two wonderful things happened; First, Fr. George, along with his family, was blessed to enjoy a much- deserved three-month sabbatical leave, traveling to faraway places, seeing sights seldom seen, and to bask in rest, relaxation, renewal, and yes, to survive the rigors of driving on the left side of the road! Second, I was blessed to be with you here at St. James, to spend time with you in a setting of worship, prayer, home visits, hospital visits, workshops, bell-tolling, anticipating the myriad of hats worn, playing with the kids, and sometimes, to get lemonade. Blessing of the Animals: October 6th

St. Francis, the patron saint of animals, is said to have had a special affinity for animals; they seemed drawn to him. Their unconditional love is said to mirror the egoless, selfless love that our Savior encouraged us to have toward one


Church by the Pond this fall

Who is Jesus to me, really? meets What is healing?

Last year we launched a two-year program of asking ourselves the question: Who is Jesus to me, really? One of the ways that we explored this question was through Bible Study. Last year we moved through Matthew's Gospel and are currently nearing the end of our exploration of Luke. What we've discovered so far is the complexity of the Gospel witness, how different they sometimes are (one from the other), and what a gracious and loving God we have in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Beginning in late October, we will launch our study of Mark's Gospel, using NT Wright again (For Everyone–Mark), to help guide us. For most of October we'll complete our deep dive into Luke's Gospel. Please join us in this encounter with God's story of Christ through Luke, meeting between the Sunday services.

On Sunday, October 27th, following the 10:15 service, Fr. George will share stories and the spiritual essence of his sabbatical (maybe with some input from his family (a)). Please plan to come. This will be the first of several conversations that will take place around the what sabbatical means for all of us, moving forward, and a time for the parish to share with Fr. George what happened, in the parish's continuing life, while he was away.

Another strand of our exploration of *Who is Jesus to me, really?* will help us confront and discuss the area of healing. Healing is something we normally consider mystical and in the realm of evangelicals. But remember, healing takes many forms. We are going to have a number of speakers, beginning



with The Reverend Tom Furrer, Priest in Charge at Trinity, Wethersfield, who will talk to us about healing ministry, his work at the Kateri Clinic in Nigeria, and how mission and healing intersect. We will later welcome a physician among us to discuss his experiences of healing and how both his vocation as a doctor and faith as a Christian intersect. More to come ...

Finally, we will be launching, on the second Monday of every month, a new opportunity to engage in dialogue that we are calling *Faith and Fries: Exploring Questions and Mysteries*. The name may change, but the idea is moving forward. During our *RenewalWorks* explorations in 2018, one suggestion for community connection, being more engaged Christians in our own town, was to begin a faith-based conversation somewhere in the community. **Beginning on Monday, November 11th at 7 pm at the Wood 'n Tap in Farmington**, and the second Monday of each month thereafter, we will hold a casual, open, anyone-is-invited conversation on the mysteries and questions of faith. The



format will be a question or subject area (let's say, what do we think healing means to us as 21st century humans?) and folks will be encouraged to share, ask questions, voice concerns, etc. The Fries, in the *Faith and Fries*, means folks are welcome to have a drink, get something to eat, relax, and engage in meaningful dialogue. We hope that folks in the parish will not only come and take advantage of this, but will also invite neighbors, friends, people who maybe are "spiritual but not religious," and whomsoever you choose. Sound like fun?

The Rev. Susan Gibson, pastor of First Church of Christ, Congregational in Farmington and Fr. George are in conversation about furthering our dialogue on faith and race, possibly in the context of healing, during Lent 2020. Stay tuned for more information!

Formation, in the Christian context, says that we are constantly trying to be formed into whoever it is God is calling us to be. Study and experience - in community - are truly indispensable ways of coming to know God in Christ more fully and deeply. We strongly encourage you to get involved in some way in adult formation this year. If you have ideas about a program that might bring us into contact with God, please let Fr. George know.

Summary of Vestry Minutes - August 29, 2019

Present: Cathie Martin, Todd Root, Michael Slusarz, Mimi Hostetter, Rebecca McFarland, Dona Waugh, Jessica Watkin, Kim Pereira. Plus guests Foster White and John Smith.

FAMILY PROMISE

We welcomed Foster White (St. James parishioner) to our meeting. Foster observed at First Church of Christ (FCCC) when they served as a host church for Family Promise in August. Summary from Foster's remarks:

- The issue with homelessness is paramount. The Family Promise organization seems wellorganized. Family Promise provides bedding and transportation
- The commitment to be a host church is huge. Currently each host church hosts one week four times per year. The guests arrive on Sunday afternoon, leave each day at 6 am, come back each day at 6 pm. The host church provides a meal. Foster's observation is that too much food was produced and there was food waste. The host church provides one male and one female "host" overnight and Safe Church training is required for those hosts
- Foster observed that FCCC provided basic set-up like lamp, small table, access to a TV for the children. It is a major process to find the volunteers to stay overnight and bring the food. The host church also provides breakfast.
- Foster suggests that St. James could get involved as a support congregation, not a host this
 is in line with what Vestry has previously agreed upon

MOTION (Todd) to get more info from FCCC and from Family Promise on becoming a "support church," Kim seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

MINUTES FROM JUNE

MOTION (Mimi) to approve the minutes, Todd seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

New Business

Rectory repairs

- An A/C replaced at the start of the summer with new 10,000 BTU A/C, John bought it and had
 it installed.
- John has done other work on toilet, disposal, going to fix shower door when part comes in.
- We are grateful to John, Michael, and Skip who work on the landscaping, house, church, etc.
- Tree work and cleaning up the yard needs to be done. A tree service will remove overgrown bushes against the house that are damaging the house, prune the dogwood in the winter, raise the canopy and do some general tree pruning, all of this for \$1,000.
- There is also a large limb that hangs over the roof and the power lines to the house; removal needed, cost is \$300.
- Some big upkeep projects need to be done with deck (rotten stairs, power-washing, railing not to code, no toe boards on the steps, needs railing at the top. This is maybe \$400 of materials. Parishioners are willing to do the labor (John and Jamie).

MOTION (Todd) to approve a \$1500 increase to the budget for the Rectory to take care of the tree work, Cathie seconded, the motion carried unanimously.

At a future meeting we will set aside time to discuss other plant needs. Vestry agrees to reach out to the buildings and grounds committee to make a written list with priorities so that we can vote on projects and budget appropriately to take care of our properties.

Diocesan Regional Wardens Ministry

Can they have use of the parish hall and the kitchen for their potluck and meeting? Boy Scouts will be asked to move for the evening to accommodate the Wardens. We agreed by general consensus that this was fine.

OLD BUSINESS

Rev. Cindy Maybeck workshops are about to begin. There are both paper and digital sign-ups. Vestry confirmed who is "hosting" each workshop. We will make a colorful flyer to be handed out at church school to advertise the 9/21 family-focused workshop.

Mimi reported on the **Living History tour on 9/28**. There will be a 3 pm start. The tour will visit Noah Wallace School, the Village Store, the Historical Society in Unionville (they are ready for us and will give a presentation), Christ Church in Avon (where we will visit the Memorial Garden, finish back at church in time for the welcome-back dinner.

Dona reported on the **Welcome Back Dinner on 9/28**. There will be a 5 pm start. The budget is based on assumption of 80 guests. 19 people have signed up for the tour and we assume those will all attend the dinner.


